With the 2017 history, and 2018 now begun, I can't help but reflect on the tremendous blessing it is to have such a fine Family History Center facility right

in our neighborhood. I also pause to review some of the wonderful accomplishments attained during the past year. We have the third busiest family history center in the valley and have experienced growing pains while some other centers have been closed.

During 2017:

- 11,454 visitors came to the center
- 1,225 first time visitors
- 132 dedicated/trained volunteers/staff served faithfully each week
- 498 activities/classes/meetings held on a wide range of topics
- Individuals from 95 different stakes visited the center
- Thousands of names sought out and prepared for temple work; a large percentage of these by our faithful youth, consultants, and their friends
- Over 100,000 documents and photos scanned
- A monthly e-mail newsletter received by over 1000 individuals.

- The Granite, Granite View, and Alta View Stakes welcomed in the Willow Creek Stake as a participating stake.
- Increased network capabilities and number of computers to allow for two fully functioning classrooms for instruction, meetings, and research.

What a glorious year it has been and such a blessing to so many. May I give a tremendous "THANK YOU" to our dedicated volunteer Temple and Family History Consultants and staff members who have made all this possible, along with the sustaining support and encouragement of the stake leadership from the four participating stakes.

President Boyd K. Packer stated:

"Family History work has the power to do something for the dead. It has equal power to do something for the living. Family History work of church members has a refining, spiritualizing, tempering influence on those who are engaged in it. They understand that they are tying their family together, their living family here with those who have gone before."

Cousins Twice Removed? 6th Cousins?

We often hear "She's my fifth cousin, twice removed," or "He's my second cousin, nine times removed." Sounds confusing, doesn't it? Trying to state the relationship between two related persons, not in the same generation or not sharing the same relationship with a shared ancestor can be confusing. And then there's the part about how to figure it out. Diane Haddad in a recent article for *Family Tree Magazine* outlined how to calculate that relationship and even created a downloadable chart to make the figuring a bit easier to understand.

What makes us a cousin? The fact that we share an ancestor with another person. But your ancestors are only the people in your direct line. To determine your cousinship, you need to identify your ancestor that you share with that cousin and how many generations separate each of you from that ancestor.

What is the relationship between your granddaughter and your sister's grandson? They are second cousins since the shared ancestor is their greatgrandparent, your parent. That one is pretty simple. But what happens when the number of generations separating the cousins and their common ancestor is different? This is when the term "removed" comes into play.

Compound this confusion by knowing that many of our ancestors married their cousins since mobility was limited, and their choice of possible mates was also limited. So, you can be related to your ancestor in more than one way. It just keeps getting better, doesn't it? I've found that especially confusing as I research my Southern ancestors. (In my family, five

families in the same area intermarried and often used the same family names!)



Are you confused yet? Perhaps looking at and using the relationship chart

will be helpful. You can go to https://www.familytreemagazine.com/premium/how-to-calculate-cousinhood/ and view the chart. Simply by clicking on the chart, you can pull up a printable PDF that you can use to determine your own relationships with shared cousins.

Is It Really a Burned County?

If you have ever heard that a county is burned from someone, you might want to reconsider that statement. Sometimes it's easier for a clerk to tell you that when the truth is otherwise. If a county has been reported burned, perhaps not all the county was destroyed. Local researchers living in the area may be familiar with "workarounds" or even know of records whose existence is not "common knowledge." Remember that some items may have be published in a newspaper, such as marriage, legal notices.
